Research pays off

On an annual basis, we participate in The Cooperative Difference Research through the Touchstone Energy Cooperative network. The feedback we get from participating members guides us in our strategic planning.

Based on the results of past surveys, we've implemented programs like Advance Pay, and we expanded our convenient payment options for members including paystations at 24 local bank branches across the county.

In recent years, we've added to our menu of energy information and online tools for members based on research results. Members expressed an interest in learning more about their individual

energy use and indicated they were looking for ideas on how they might be able to save energy dollars. What better source to turn to than your own electric co-op for that information?

Looking ahead

The preliminary results of our 2019 Cooperative Difference Survey are in, and we're anxiously waiting for the final report. This year, the focus was on gauging member interest in technologies like smart thermostats, smart water heaters, community solar and a variety of other things.

Stay tuned. We will soon be introducing some new things through our social media channels and South Carolina Living magazine.

One more thing

The Cooperative Difference Survey results also tell us that members believe it's important for us to be involved in community activities, particularly youth development programs. I can't think of a better example of this than the Cooperative Youth Tour and Cooperative Youth Summit opportunities we offer each year.

We've devoted four of our six local pages to these programs this month. I urge you to read their individual testimonies of their experiences. I think you'll agree that Horry Electric and Horry County were well represented by these young people.

WIRE, Youth Summit participants aid students in need

STUDENTS WHO find themselves without a permanent residence will have it a little easier thanks to Women Involved in Rural Electrification (WIRE) and participants in this summer's South Carolina Cooperative Youth Summit.

Participants in the Youth Summit, a cooperative-sponsored educational program for rising high school seniors, joined volunteers from WIRE chapters across the state July 11 at Mid-Carolina Electric Cooperative in Lexington. They put together 448 bags of supplies for temporarily homeless youth. Each bag held personal hygiene items, as well as laundry detergent.

Peggy Dantzler of SC WIRE, the coordinating organization for the cooperative-affiliated community outreach organization, asked the Youth Summit students, "How many of you take shampoo for granted? How many of you have soap in your bathroom? We take these things for granted. These kids don't even have that."

SC WIRE Chair Bobbie Cook noted, "These students come from all socioeconomic backgrounds." Their families have faced setbacks such as losing jobs, she said. "They stay with relatives, in hotels, in cars or with friends," added Cook, a retiree from Aiken Electric Cooperative.

After the Kids Closet effort, Susan Brown, Lynn Elvis, Jessie Robinson and Kelli McDowell of Horry's WIRE chapter took 52 bags with them-26 for girls and 26 for boys. They later delivered the bags to the Horry County Schools to be distributed to students in need.

Throughout the year, local WIRE chapters assist children and families served by electric co-ops in other ways. Horry's chapter provides scholarships to local students. Through SC WIRE, all chapters help fund annual scholarships for women who want to continue their education. The Jenny Ballard Opportunity Scholarship is named for a WIRE founder. WIRE reflects electric cooperatives' commitment to community.



Pay your electric bill on time, every time!

THE BANK DRAFT PROGRAM from Horry Electric Cooperative makes it easier to pay your bill on time and to keep track of drafts. When you sign up for this program, Horry Electric will automatically Bank Draft draft your checking or savings account for the amount of your monthly electric bill. You'll still receive monthly statements showing kilowatt-hour usage and the amount due, but you won't have to write a check.

The best part is that you won't ever have to worry about your payment getting to Horry Electric on time. Your account will not be drafted until the actual due date indicated on your bill. If that date falls on a bank holiday, it will be drafted

the following business day. As with writing a check, all you have to do is make sure there is adequate money in your account. Otherwise, it will be processed as a return

check and additional charges will be applied.

Simplify your life! Just fill out and send us the form below. It may take a few days to process your request. So continue to pay

your bill until "Bank Draft" appears on it. After that, you'll never have to remember to write a check to Horry Electric to pay your electric bill again! 3

Would weekly payments suit you better?

WITH ADVANCE PAY, HEC members have the opportunity to pay for electricity when they want and in the amounts they want! No more fees and no more security deposit!

Participants won't get a monthly bill, but that's because they're paying for electric service in advance. Energy use is calculated daily, and account history is available online and by phone, any time of the day or night.

Is it right for you? If it would be easier for you to make weekly or biweekly payments rather than one large payment each month, then you'll want to consider

Advance Pav. Members who choose prepaid electricity programs say it



helps them lower electric consumption due to a greater awareness of use patterns.

Before making a final decision, carefully read the Terms and Conditions. Members initiating service will need to be prepared to pay a membership fee, application fee, any applicable construction fees and establish at least a \$50 credit balance on the account. Visit HorryElectric.com for details. @
